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Introduction

The Partnership

The East Lincolnshire Community Safety Partnership was established in response to the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 which places a statutory duty on responsible authorities to work together to develop and implement strategies to reduce crime and disorder. The responsible authorities are:

- Boston Borough and East Lindsey District Councils
- Lincolnshire County Council
- Lincolnshire Police and Police Authority
- Lincolnshire Fire and Rescue
- NHS Lincolnshire
- Lincolnshire Probation Trust

Probation became a responsible authority (rather than a cooperating body) in April 2010 through the Police & Crime Bill 2008. This also widens the responsibilities of the partnership to include reducing reoffending.

Other agencies also contribute to the partnership including Lincolnshire Criminal Justice Board (LCJB), local magistrates, Addaction, Boston Mayflower, New Linx Housing Trust, Longhurst Homes and the Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership.

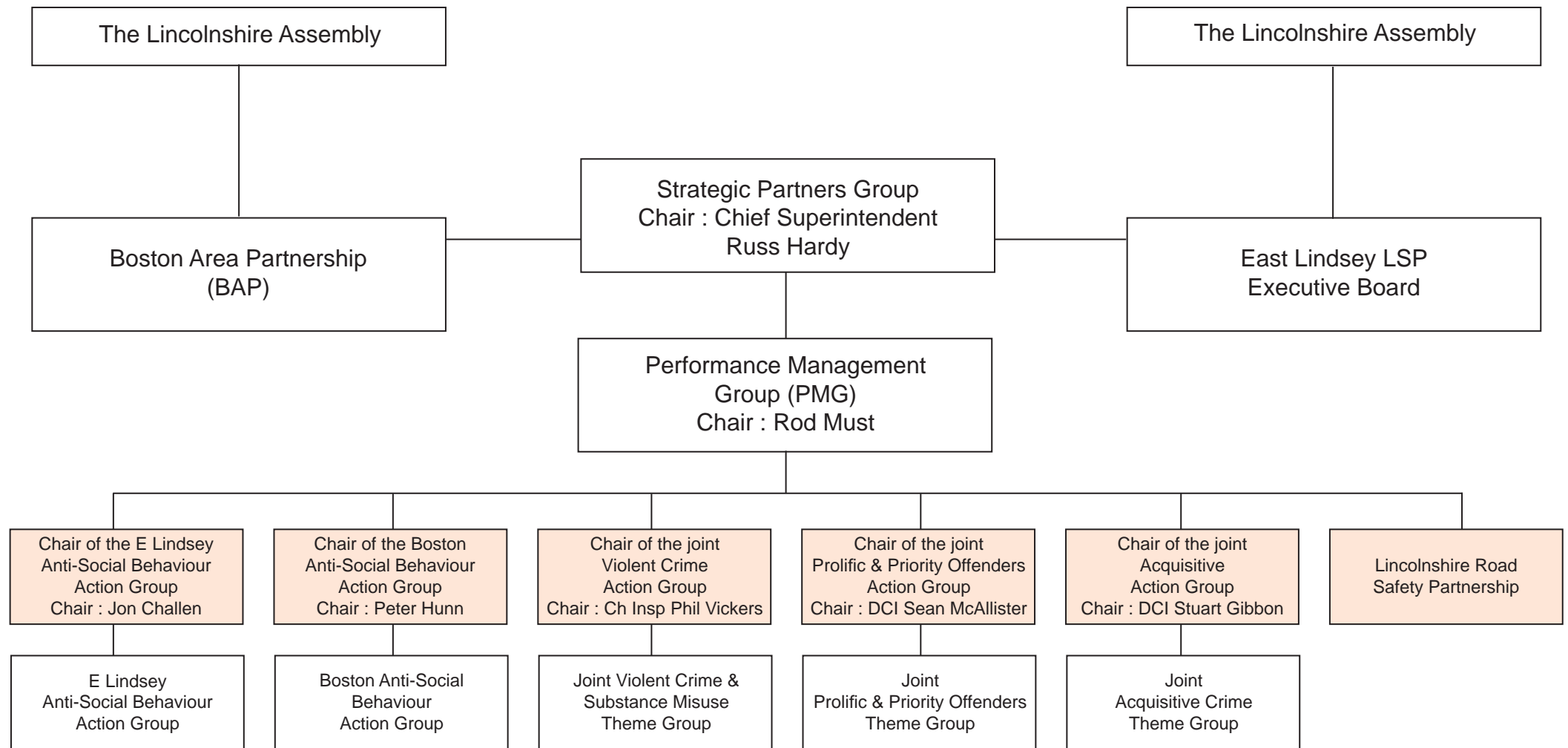
Strategic leadership of the partnership is provided by the East Lincolnshire Community Partnership Strategic Group, comprising senior officers of the above authorities. The Strategic Group is responsible for producing an annual Strategic Assessment which takes into account a range of data from the partner agencies to provide an overview of crime, disorder and anti-social behaviour in the area. This enables the partnership to decide where to focus resources over the coming year.

Performance against the partnership's priorities is monitored and reviewed by the Performance Management Group (PMG), which will highlight any exceptions in performance to the Strategic Group. The full Performance Management Framework is included in Appendix 1.

Operational work is co-ordinated through thematic groups who coordinate the production of action plans detailing the work to be carried out to tackle each priority area over the forthcoming year.

Delivery Structures - East Lincolnshire Community Safety Partnership

The following diagram shows how the line of responsibility passes up through the action groups through to the chair of the partnership. At the same time, representatives from both Boston's Local strategic Partnership, the Boston Area Partnership, and East Lindsey's Local Strategic Partnership ensure that performance data is passed through both LSPs to the Lincolnshire Assembly.



Purpose of the plan

This plan sets out the priorities for the East Lincolnshire Community Safety Partnership and how we will tackle them. The plan covers a three year period but is refreshed annually to incorporate any changes to the priorities.

The priorities are selected using the Annual Strategic Assessment which includes information gathered through community consultation. This ensures that the priorities of the local community are reflected in the plan as well as the evidence base of local statistics.

Achievements to date

Acquisitive Crime

- Crime prevention stalls in Boston, Spilsby and Mablethorpe
- Car park ticket and Crime Stopper campaigns
- A scheme offering crime prevention advice and support to every victim of domestic burglary in Boston and Horncastle
- A Caravan Project targeting caravan parks across the East Lindsey
- Operation Lighthouse targeting vulnerable unattended properties
- 'Making a positive contribution' programme for primary school children

Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB)

- Extension of Fairplay football scheme to allow 4 additional tournaments to be held in Boston engaging with over 400 youths
- Go For IT Programme of diversionary events during school holidays
- Go Out Get Involved diversionary events during school holidays

Violent Crime

- Designated Public Place Orders (DPPOs) set up in Boston, Skegness and Horncastle
- Christmas Street Warden Scheme to support the local policing and partnership teams in managing the night time economy
- Improving standards in licensed premises through schemes such as Inn Keeping with Integrity
- Use of Itemiser at Safe Zones and on enforcement operations
- Use of area CCTV Teams to support in local issues

Current Priorities

The key priorities for East Lincolnshire Community Safety Partnership for 2010-11 are:

Anti-social Behaviour (including criminal damage, hate crime and arson)

Violent Crime (including domestic abuse, sexual offences, violence against the person)

Substance Misuse (including drugs and alcohol)

Reducing Reoffending & Prolific and Other Priority Offenders (selected criminals with the highest level of criminal activity in the District)

Acquisitive Crime (including robbery, domestic and non-domestic burglary, theft of and from vehicles and theft from shops)

Road Safety (including reduction in Killed or Seriously Injured adults and young people and localised speeding issues)

- tackling the fear of crime
- the seasonal nature of crime in East Lindsey

In addition to the five priority areas, there are two cross cutting themes to be considered as high priority in all of the partnership's work, these are:

- tackling the fear of crime
- the seasonal nature of crime in East Lindsey

The action plans on pages 8 to 32 detail the strategies for how these priorities will be delivered along with the role of each partner in supporting delivery of the priorities and available resources.

Funding to deliver the partnership plan comes from two main sources; Area Based Grant (ABG) and Basic Command Unit (BCU). This is in addition to mainstream funding from partners which enables delivery of work streams and projects as part of core business (e.g. Anti-Social Behaviour Officers & Community Safety Officers).

Priority 1 : Anti-Social Behaviour & Road Safety

Why Anti-Social Behaviour & Road Safety are priorities for East Lincolnshire CSP

The number of reported ASB incidents has increased year on year in both Boston and East Lindsey between October 2006 and September 2009. These increases (13% in East Lindsey and 15% in Boston) are not in line with the county-wide increase of 2% during the same period. In relation to residents' confidence in the police and local public services to deal with local concerns, both districts had a worse confidence rate than the national average. Anti-Social Behaviour is also commonly cited as an issue for the community through the neighbourhood panels and consultation events.

In terms of Road Safety, An increasing percentage of people Killed or Seriously Injured (KSI) in Lincolnshire are happening within the East CSP, with the East now accounting for 30% of all KSIs. In line with the county, 5% of those KSI are U16, a percentage that has decreased on the East in the last 3 years. 27% of the KSIs in the East involve a driver aged 17 to 24. Currently 1 in 3 KSI in the county with drivers within this age range are taking place in the East, a proportion that has been increasing in recent years. As with ASB, road safety is commonly cited by the community as a priority issue.

How the Partnership will address Anti-Social Behaviour & Road Safety and the Anticipated Outcomes

The East Lincolnshire Community Safety Partnership will deliver a marketing campaign to raise awareness of how the public can report Anti-Social Behaviour and the response they can expect in return. Whilst this may result in an increase in reported ASB incidents it is anticipated that this will improve the perception of ASB being a problem and also improve confidence in the police other local authorities' response to it. In addition, minimum standards for what the public can expect in relation to ASB complaints have now been published.

Road safety will be addressed by encouraging the use of interactive speed signs to reduce speeding through towns and villages. Improved links with the Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership will identify where the Community Safety Partnership can support their work or address any localised gaps.

Priority 2: Violent Crime & Substance Misuse

Why Violent Crime & Substance Misuse are priorities for the East Lincolnshire Community Safety Partnership

Violence against the person offences accounted for 16% of all recorded crime in Boston and 19% in East Lindsey in 2008/09. Assault with Injury (NI 20) have increased in both Boston (94 offences, 30%) and East Lindsey (49 offences, 7%) between 2007/08 and 2008/09. In addition, both districts have seen a growing proportion of violence against the person and all crime that is alcohol related, although this increase has steadied in the last year. Reasons for the increase may in part be due to improved recording. However, Alcohol now accounts for between a third to over two-fifths of all violent crime and 8-11% of all crime, highlighting this as a significant contributor to crime in both districts.

How the partnership will address Violent Crime & Substance Misuse and the Anticipated Outcomes

East Lincolnshire Community Safety Partnership aims to reduce alcohol related violent crime by focusing on the night-time economy. Initiatives such as Street Pastors, Evening Safety Wardens and improved standards in licensed premises will reduce the likelihood of alcohol-fuelled violence. These initiatives will also reduce hospital admissions through fewer injuries sustained and a reduced need for assistance by ambulance staff. Initiatives will also focus on reducing repeat incidents of domestic abuse through raised awareness of support services and target hardening the homes of victims.

Priority 3: Acquisitive Crime

Why Acquisitive Crime is a priority for East Lincolnshire Community Safety Partnership

Serious Acquisitive Crime (NI 16) accounted for approximately 12% of all crime in Boston and East Lindsey in 2008/09. Within the last year both districts have recorded significant decreases in serious acquisitive crime. However other acquisitive crimes, such as theft from shops, have seen increases in both districts with the most significant increase recorded in Boston (50.6%). Burglary other than dwelling also remains an issue in both districts. East Lindsey has recorded year on year increases between October 2006 and September 2009. In Boston there was an increase of almost 100 offences between 2006/7 (346 offences) and 2007/8 (444 offences), although the levels in 2008/9 are similar to those in 2006/7 (343 offences).

How the Partnership will address Acquisitive Crime and the Anticipated Outcomes

East Lincolnshire Community Safety Partnership will raise awareness of crime prevention techniques to the public in order to reduce the number of victims of acquisitive crime. Victims will be supported (e.g. through target hardening and provision of advice) in order to reduce their chances of becoming a repeat victim. Several events will be held in East Lindsey and Boston to provide information on how to reduce the chances of becoming a victim of acquisitive crime. These events will include the use of the 'Inside Out Car' which demonstrates how leaving items on display in vehicles can attract thieves.

At county level the DNA Property Marking Scheme also contributes to tackling acquisitive crime. This was commissioned at county level and is being managed by the Crime Reduction and Community Safety Manager (Lincs Police).

Priority 4: Prolific & other Priority Offenders

Why Prolific & other Priority Offenders are a priority for East Lincolnshire Community Safety Partnership

It is widely known that a relatively small number of people cause a disproportionate amount of crime. The PPO scheme was introduced to target these most prolific offenders in the offending population and provide end-to-end multi-agency management of them.

In 2008/9 the East Lincolnshire PPO Cohort included 31 individuals; 15 were from the Boston district and 16 were from East Lindsey. The reduction in re-offending for the East Lincolnshire PPO cohort in 2008/9 was 67.5%, with a reduction of 56 proven offences compared to the baseline. The reduction for Boston was 15 proven offences (62.5%), while in East Lindsey it was 41 proven offences (69.5%).

How the Partnership will address Prolific & Other Priority Offenders and the Anticipated Outcomes

Prolific and other Priority Offenders (PPOs) will continue to be managed by the East Lincolnshire PPO scheme with performance being monitored through the CSP.

Community Engagement

This will feed into the Strategic Assessment enabling the partnership to take these into account when setting priorities for the forthcoming year.

Marketing Campaign

The partnership is running a marketing campaign from April to October 2010 to raise the profile of the partnership and more specifically what the partnership can do to tackle anti-social behaviour. The campaign slogan is 'Anti-Social Behaviour: Don't suffer it, report it' and it encourages people to report any incidents to their local anti-social behaviour team. The marketing campaign encompasses various methods of communication as

- T-shirts for Community Safety & Anti-Social Behaviour Officers
- Highlighter pens
- Beer mats

Appendix 1: Performance Management Framework

Performance Management Arrangements at CSP Level

At district level all Community Safety Partnerships, with the exception of North Kesteven, have adopted the structure below to ensure the delivery of their priorities. This structure ensures that performance is embedded within all groups of the partnership and that governance and accountability arrangements are in place to manage performance.

District CSP Accountability and Governance Structure for Performance Management

Stage 3: **Strategic Group** receives exception report from Performance Management Group.
PMG is accountable to the Strategic Group in relation to performance

Stage 2: **Performance Management Group** (PMG) hold Theme Group Chairs to account for performance

Stage 1: **Theme Groups** review performance reports

The following details the three different stages of performance reporting to each of the different partnership groups within the CSP and the roles and responsibilities for each in relation to performance management.

Stage 1: Reporting to Theme Groups

1. Quarterly performance management report drafted by Performance Manager, Safer Communities Team, LCC and sent to Theme Group 7 days before meeting. Performance report to be based upon priorities and indicators outlined within the partnership plan.
2. Theme Group chairs discuss performance reports at Theme group meetings. Theme group to agree the commentary they will provide back to the performance management group for each indicator around how they are addressing or plan to address poor performance and what activity they can demonstrate has contributed to good performance. Commentary to be added to the performance report. An overall summary of performance is also to be added to the theme group report.
3. Theme group to also complete progress against action plans, providing commentary and status symbols for each action.
4. Analytical support to be provided to Theme Group's through the Crime Analyst, Safer Communities Team, LCC if additional analysis is required to understand performance issues or support commissioning.
5. Performance report to be returned to Performance Manager, Safer Communities Team, LCC within 7 days of the meeting.

6. Performance Manager to forward completed report to Performance Management Group (PMG) 7 days before PMG meeting.

Stage 2: Reporting to Performance Management Groups

1. PMG to review performance report received from theme groups.
2. PMG to offer support and challenge in relation to performance issues. PMG to decide if the commentary within the performance report is sufficient or if additional explanation is required. PMG to consider the progress of the theme groups since the last meeting in addressing previous performance challenges and any areas of consistent poor performance.
3. Where further information is required from Theme Groups in relation to their activity this is to be provided by the Theme Group chairs within the timescales set by the PMG. Where further information is required in relation to performance data this is to be provided by the Performance Manager, Safer Communities Team, LCC within the timescales set by the PMG.
4. PMG to decide on the exceptions (good and bad) that they will provide in an exception report to the Strategic Group. Report to detail the actions that will be undertaken by the Theme Groups or PMG to address areas of poor performance.
5. Performance Manager, Safer Communities Team, LCC to prepare the exception report based on requirements agreed by the PMG.
6. Performance Manager, Safer Communities, LCC to provide the exception report to the Strategic Group with the full performance report attached as an appendices. Report to be provided to the Strategic Group 7 days before their meeting. Copy to be sent to the PMG.

Stage 3: Reporting to Strategic Groups

1. Strategic Group to review performance report regarding exceptions received from the PMG.
2. Consideration to be given to whether the action to address performance issues is sufficient or whether further support for the theme group is required.
3. Requests for further supporting information from themes groups in relation to action to address performance should be followed up by the PMG Chair within agreed timescales. Where further information is required in relation to performance data this is to be provided by the Performance Manager, Safer Communities Team, LCC within agreed timescales.
4. Consideration to be given to issues that may need raising at the CSB or relevant SMB.
