Aby	There are no sites that individually meet the Community level of provision, however, when the local circular footpath routes are added to smaller local areas of greenspace, there is almost 2ha of space available to the local population. Tothill, Mother and Greenfield and Swinn Woods are more than capable of meeting the size requirements for the local level of provision but are not currently publically accessible. A cluster of seven smaller contiguous sites at Swaby Valley provide an area of 22.59ha, over half of which is accessible, including a Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust Reserve. Below the size threshold there are also a number of smaller sites that are accessible or partially accessible, which contribute to opportunities for people and wildlife, including Rigsby Wood Trust Reserve (15.15ha). At a medium level Burwell Wood, and a number of other contiguous sites meet the standard, although formal access to the sites is very limited. There are no strategic scale sites in this area. The Public Footpath Network is good and would allow predominantly off road walking around most of the village and a round walk to Belleau of 3 km (1.75 miles) and approximately 1.4ha of footpath access. Addlethorpe	Addlethorpe Golf Course is large enough to meet the community level of provision but has no open access through public footpaths and only being available to paying customers. If the local footpath is added to smaller scale provision, there is almost 2ha of greenspace available to the local community. At a local scale, the beach is within the 2km threshold and provides an extensive area of natural recreation space and this clearly covers the medium and strategic level of provision as well.
