## Addendum to the Sustainability Appraisal of the East Lindsey Core Strategy

## **New Policy - Specialist Housing for Older People**

The impacts arising from this policy are split between neutral and positive. There are a number of neutral outcomes as the policy does not specifically deal with these issues (such as biodiversity and landscape/townscape) as they are deal with in greater detail in other policies of the plan and there is not need for duplication. The positive outcomes come largely from the proposed location of such development, in towns and large villages; the nature of the housing in that it provides for specialist need so meets the needs of the wider population and is inclusive; and that the policy deals specifically with the issue of flood risk, which is an issue for the coast where the needs of the aging population require addressing.
