

East Lindsey District Council - Corporate Peer Challenge – Signposting Template

This note signposts you to publications, information, discussion forums and examples of practice and policy that may be helpful to inform your further thinking about some of the feedback messages provided by the peer team.

Section 1: Signposting to practical support available from the LGA

The LGA Productivity Programme has an important role to play in supporting councils to achieve better for less. We have focused on critical high spend areas such as children's, adults and families, procurement and capital assets. Additionally, the programme will also support councils as they explore radical new ways of working, and respond to the opportunities created by the Localism Bill and Open Public Services White Paper. The programme aims to provide practical support to councils as they grapple with the challenges local government faces to deliver better for less.

The <u>Productivity Expert</u> Programme offers to fund a small number of productivity 'experts' (members, officers or private sector representatives with experience in delivering change programmes) to work with a group of councils over a 6-9 month period of time to assist with their productivity issues. These could relate to a single service redesign e.g. adult social care, children's services, waste, or a council wide transformation programme. <u>The Knowledge Hub</u> is a new online platform for building professional networks in the local government sector. The latest technology and social networking models enable individuals to create connections to peers and experts in their fields of interest, helping them share learning, experiences and ideas, and drive sector self-regulation and improvement. <u>https://knowledgehub.local.gov.uk/home</u>

LG Inform is a free and open online service allows anyone in the sector to access, compare and analyse data and present their findings. The LGA's Workforce Consultancy unit continues to provide direct support to councils throughout this year. The team helps councils to modernise their pay and grading structures, develop new shared management teams, assists councils in setting Top Pay and addressing performance management for senior staff. The team of strategic and operational HR specialists have first-hand experience of local government and solid understanding of the challenges facing the sector. This offers essential high class leadership development for councillors in leadership positions from across the political spectrum. The programme focuses on enhancing participants' leadership style, building skill and confidence, and creating valuable support networks among peers in other councils and parties.

The <u>Ashridge Virtual Learning Resource Centre (VLRC)</u> caters for the learning and development needs of local government political and managerial leaders. Subscribers can access a range of development materials through our specially-designed tool for leadership competencies, covering the LGA's political skills framework and managerial leadership skills. The LGA has partnered with Ashridge Business School to provide this bespoke VLRC.

<u>Localism</u>

Asset Management:

- <u>Capital Assets Pathfinders Phase 1 & 2 2010/2012</u>: 26 councils have been involved and have achieved significant local savings that have gone some way to offsetting the 28 per cent reduction in the Rate Support Grant. It has resulted in more efficient use of the existing public assets in their locality. Together with a sophisticated use of customer insight data the programme also achieved better outcomes for customers. Impressive savings will be delivered by the programme over the next 10 years. - Empowering communities: making the most of local assets A councillors' guide. The LGA and Locality have recently produced a guide for councillors exploring the different tools available to help communities have greater control of valuable community assets - from the new Community Right to Bid through to lessons from five years of community asset transfer work. Income Generation and Benchmarking:

- Enterprising councils: getting the most from trading and charging: With the new General Power of Competence being introduced following the Localism Act, councils will have a greater degree of freedom to trade and charge. This will allow them to think innovatively about new products and services and how to offer existing services more cost effectively. Commissioning

- The LGA have recently engaged with a number of local authorities to help to develop a common understanding of commissioning and the challenges faced by the sector in using commissioning as a key mechanism for transformational change. The resultant narrative (attached and soon to be published on the LGA website) includes details of the programmes of work underway or in development across the LGA aimed at supporting councils to be effective commissioners. These include:
 - <u>Keep it REAL support programme</u> supporting councils in effective commissioning with the Voluntary and Community Sector.
 - <u>Culture and sport commissioning support</u> a programme to support for Members and Officers leading culture and sport services to exploit the opportunities presented by commissioning.
 - <u>Workforce development and transformation</u> support councils on service transformation including workforce implications of commissioning.
 - Productivity programme work on procurement The productivity programme's support to councils on procurement as an essential part of the commissioning process.
- The LGA Knowledge Hub hosts a number of relevant groups that aim to share information and learning on effective commissioning. In particular the <u>Strategic</u> <u>Commissioning</u> Group, which has over 1,100 members and the <u>Local Government</u> <u>collaborative Commissioning Group</u>.
- The LGA <u>Leadership Academy</u> is soon to include a module on Strategic Commissioning and Partnerships. The aim of the module is to explore the changing climate for commissioning and partnership working and the implications this has; look

at the frameworks underpinning commissioning and partnership arrangements, understand commissioning as a mechanism for change and share learning about the key commissioning challenges and opportunities it presents.

Economic Growth

LGA local growth campaign

While the institutional landscape has changed recently with the emergence of local enterprise partnerships (LEPs) and the abolition of regional development agencies (RDAs), councils remain one of the key drivers of growth. Councils' continued work on economic growth is therefore vital. However, there is a need for a wide debate in the local government sector which demonstrates our renewed ambition and sets some new boundaries in our thinking.

Local Growth campaign: What councils are doing

Councils work together with private companies to create the East Kent Recovery and Growth package.

Stevenage Council has prioritised enterprise and inward investment for the town.

Grow your own way: Taking a localist approach to regeneration

This report provides an analysis of a number of successful regeneration programmes from across the country, with an additional international comparison. It shows that regeneration is an incredibly complex issue and that any successful approach needs to consider more than just physical and economic issues.

The research highlights the need for regeneration programmes to be locally led and that centralist interventions, backed by large scale capital investment, are only able to achieve certain objectives and should be consigned to the past, particularly given the decreasing amount of funding available.

Local leadership was perhaps the most common and consistent theme throughout the case studies examined and the role should be embraced across the county.

Commercialising innovation

The Local Government Association (LGA) has commissioned independent research on innovation. Councils recognise the important role that innovation plays in providing new sources of wealth and jobs. Overview and scrutiny

The following documents have all been produced by the <u>Centre for Public Scrutiny</u>. - <u>Accountability Works</u> general research about accountability, transparency and involvement as elements of good governance, and how scrutiny fits in to the wider local accountability landscape. CfPS has produced a framework called "<u>Accountability Works for You</u>" that is intended to provide a guide for people to analyse and evaluate their own governance arrangements – this is supplemented by <u>a similar guide designed specifically for overview and scrutiny</u>.
- <u>Green Light</u> / <u>On the Money</u> two companion briefings looking at the use by scrutiny of performance management information and finance information respectively. Both documents are paid-for but a free summary of both has also been produced and is available on request.
- <u>Aiming for the best</u>: using lessons from complaints to improve public services. This research uses the principles behind customer insight, and practical examples from named authorities, to see how the experiences of service users can be fed into improvement plans through scrutiny.
- <u>Tipping the scales</u> a piece of research that showcases a new model for overview and scrutiny that captures the impact and potential return on investment of scrutiny investigations – the focus being on scrutiny securing positive, tangible outcomes for local people (see also "<u>Measuring what matters</u>")
- <u>Counting the cost, measuring the value</u>: Research on how scrutiny can incorporate a consideration of value for money
- <u>A cunning plan</u> report about the way that scrutiny can programme its work more effectively.
- <u>The lion that roared</u> report about using overview and scrutiny's annual report as a tool for improvement.
- <u>Pulling it together</u> a comprehensive rundown of the law relating to overview and scrutiny, setting out powers and responsibilities, updated in May 2012.

CfPS also periodically produces <u>policy briefings</u> on the possible scrutiny response to a range of current local government issues, including academisation, equalities impact assessments, economic development and many others.
